COMMITTEE STATS & STRATEGIES

This section teaches you exactly how to stand out, even if you are a beginner.

1. Understanding Typical Committee Stats

These are approximate, based on most Indian MUNs:

- **Delegate Count:** 30–80 delegates
- **2. Speaking Time:**
 - Main speeches: 45 seconds – 2 minutes
 - Moderated caucus: 20–45 seconds
 - Rebuttals: 10–20 seconds
- **3. Evaluation (General Pattern):**
 - Content & Research → 40%
 - Delivery & Clarity → 25%
 - Rebuttals & Crisis Handling → 20%
 - Procedure Usage & Involvement → 15%

These values may vary per MUN, but the pattern is similar everywhere.

2. Strategies To Stand Out Like A Top Delegate

These are tried-and-tested, deeply explained tips.

- Speak Early → Get Noticed Early

Being among the first 5–6 speakers gives:

- Higher visibility
- Establishes authority
- EB starts paying attention

- Prepare a Speech Bank (Most Useful Tip)

Before committee, prepare:

Speech Bank Includes:

- 3–4 opening speeches
- 7–10 subtopic speeches
- 5–8 rebuttals
- 3–4 crisis-style responses
- 3–5 closing lines

This ensures you NEVER get stuck.

3. Use Facts & Examples to Sound Strong

Most delegates speak emotionally. You stand out when you speak factually.

Sources to use (simple ones):

- NCRB Data
- Government reports
- News (last 1–2 years)
- Simple statistics
- Case studies

4. Propose Strong Moderated Caucus Topics

EB loves delegates who drive the debate.

Examples of good topics:

- “Coordination between intelligence agencies”
- “Strengthening border security mechanisms”
- “Role of state police modernization”

5. Build Alliances (Very Important)

During unmoderated caucus:

- Talk to nearby delegates
- Identify ideological allies
- Share your subtopic areas

You cannot win without alliances.

6. Master Rebuttals (The Skill That Wins Awards)

Good rebuttals:

- Short
- Logical
- Based on facts
- Connected to ideology

Avoid:

- Screaming
- Personal attacks
- Irrelevant points

7. Stay Consistent from Start to End

If you change your stance halfway, you lose points.

A consistent delegate = a reliable delegate.

8. Engage with the Executive Board Properly

- Ask good questions.
- Show interest.
- Be active.
- But don't overdo it.
